Dear Teachers and Colleagues,



Beginning in g1993, Ms. Kogen directed a summer music camp called "Let Music Be the Food of Peace," which won many awards and celebrated its 10th anniversary with Ms. Kogen's retirement in 2003. For the last eighteen years, Ms. Kogen has pursued rhythm and movement through the experiential rhythm system TaKeTiNa, and has presented workshops at numerous universities around the United States.
