Baroque Dances in Eugene



In the last October Con Brio, Janet Pollack explained about the program "Dance Music and Baroque Dance Rhythms" that Daniel Stephens and Judith Kennedy would present. Well, on November 12 at the OMTA meeting, we met Daniel and Judith. After a general overview, they took turns in giving historic and artistic input about a dance, and then performed it. They distributed nicely organized handouts, with information about the choreographer and the composer for each dance followed by graphs for the

choreography.

In matter of artistry, I was very astonished to discover that the dancers would step up on the downbeat of the music. It gives the dance a sort of elegant "légèreté." Dancers would stand sometimes tall on the ball of their feet, and this movement led to the ballerina "point" in the following centuries.

The historical vignettes were instructive and fun! It was nice to imagine the sumptuous palace's ballroom where Louis XIV, a great dancer, would move about at the sound of the music. The protocol at the ball was rigorous, and if you could not dance, better stay outside! A segment of an historic letter was read, revealing that taking lessons in order to be ready for the ball was an important task, and sometimes a burden.

We were reminded that Louis XIV created the "Academy Royale of Dance" in 1661, and then the "Academy Royale of Music" in 1672. You know, in France, there is a support program for artists who wish to be professional, meaning trying to live by their art only. One wonders if the artistic spirit of Louis is still influencing the French

government! Also, wouldn't it be nice to see our dear Politicians move so graciously at the sound of elegant music? Maybe that would soften the atmosphere, and bring some wisdom. The program ended with all of us learning the steps of the Minuet. It was a happy lesson!

Congratulations to the following students from the studios of Winnine Kerner and Lucy Clevenger for being chosen to move on to the State Recital on December 2:

- Ellie and Timmy, playing Moszkowsky's Spanish Dances, Op. 12, No. 1 & 2
- Owen and Teresa, playing "Ballet" from Petite Suite by Debussy
- Ishika and Summer, playing "Dance of the Reed Flutes" from Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Suite
- Kate and Kendrick, playing "Waltz" from Rachmaninoff's Six Pieces, Op. 11

It has been a pleasure to serve the OMTA as the Ensemble Festival for a number years. This will be my last year serving as chair and hope to offer some suggestion from my years of experience with this festival:

The recital was held at the University of Oregon in room 190 and, although it's a beautiful space to have a recital, the room requires set-up ahead of time and is expensive, as we are being charged an hourly rate, in addition to piano tunings. In the past we have held it here because of the availability of two pianos and the donation of the room rental. This helped OMTA profit in the past, but this year the festival ended up in the red. In addition to that, we only needed one piano which makes me question the need of having the recital there in the first place.

Reserving a room at UO in early summer, for the possibility of needing two pianos in November - and losing revenue for that decision, should be brought to the OMTA's attention to see if there's some solution to the problem. I'm not sure about any other location that would have two pianos in one room and dislike the idea of limiting an ensemble's repertoire so I leave these suggestions up for a debate that's open to more ideas.

- Have the UO liaison work out some sort of non-profit discount with the University of Oregon.
- Hold this festival at another location.

I also feel that the event's future chair would benefit from having the Master List and the Entry forms combined into one, or even having the master list simplified. I will provide Genevieve with some prototypes to discuss with the group in the future.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve the OMTA's Ensemble Festival. It has been such a pleasure to chair this event and work with its participating teachers!

MINUTES Eugene District OMTA • General Meeting Monday, November 12, 2018 • First Congregational Church, Eugene

President Mason called the meeting to order at 9:34 am.

The October minutes were approved.

Treasurer's report is in Con Brio.

Committee Reports

<u>Membership</u>: New member: Kim Wonkak, clarinet teacher at UO. On 11/29, we will send two representatives, Sandy Hull and Ellen McQuilkin, to speak to pedagogy students at UO. We have members who teach there; President Mason wants to pursue this further.

<u>Publicity</u>: Website: Contents of the library needs to be put on the website. The contact person may need updating too.

Student Activities

<u>Festival of Popular Music</u>: (President Mason spoke for Wyatt Burger). There were 54 students from 14 teachers. New income was \$430. Last year there were only 25 students, so this was a large increase.

<u>Sonatina Festival</u>: (Fern McArthur) It's now called "OMTA Sonatina Festival". It was a fun event. There were 26 teachers representing 7 districts (more than half of the 13 statewide) and 66 students. Nobuko LeBeau, Marty Czonka, and Janet Pollack, and Sandy Hull all helped. There were also volunteers from Portland and Salem. UO was very generous and reduced the price because we used fewer rooms than planned. There were 4 Eugene teachers participating; their students did very well. The adjudicator said that the playing level was excellent.

<u>Fall Syllabus</u>: 22 students and 11 teachers participated. Genevieve Mason, Nobuko LeBeau, and Sandy Hull helped. Note: when you fill out the Syllabus forms, when filling out the student's day preference, if you have a religious date restriction, put it in Leggiero, then put a sticky note or other note on the invoice, which is confidential. You can change the exam type right up until the student walks in the door.

<u>Ensemble Festival</u>: There were 15 ensembles in one recital. 30 students participated. The room was in disarray - parents helped set up the room. If Michael Reiter hadn't been there the benches would have been locked up! Michael tuned two pianos, but we only needed one. The position description for Chair of the Ensemble Festival needs to include communicating our needs more accurately to Mike Reiter (UO tuner) and David Mason (UO scheduler) so unnecessary pianos are not tuned and the rooms are not left cluttered with non-required stuff (i.e. how many benches, tables, easels, etc. are needed).

<u>Announcements</u>

<u>Barnes and Noble</u>: Lucy will re-send the vouchers in pdf format. Saturday is full and Sunday is almost full. There was general agreement that the 2nd weekend in December would be better (tuck this away for next year). The 1st weekend is too soon after Thanksgiving. We can decide after we see the results from this year. Vouchers can be used during the full week of December 15 - December 21. You can order books online, but our percentage is lower.

<u>Baroque Festival</u>: Barbara Myrick and Larry Clabby will be the adjudicators - no travel fee will be required.
