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
President's Message, February 2021,

Hello everybody,

Our OMTA state meetings, including the OMTA President Round Table, and the OMTA Board meeting took place online yesterday, Saturday January 30. It was nice to meet with our colleagues from all over Oregon. Our State President Sarah Ball brought the results of the survey done last Fall. 99 members participated. It shows how Covid 19 has affected in different ways about 45% of the participants. Please, let us know if you are having difficulties, or if you are aware of some members having

a hard time. We can always give a phone call, or send a card. At the same time, 70% of the participants say they kept their students, or even got more students. I was quite astonished, and happy to hear that.

We were also reminded that the MTNA virtual conference is taking place on March 13-17, and registration is cheaper if you register prior to February 15. February 8, 2021 Meeting and Program

Hello Members,

I am delighted that The Eugene District of the Oregon Music Teachers Association in partnership with the Oregon Community Foundation and the Nellie Tholen Fund will present a free lecture for pianists, piano teachers and all who would be interested on Monday, February 8, 2021 from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. presented by Dr. Jill Timmons, NCTM. No pre-registration, membership or fee is required. Please feel free to invite friends, students, and other interested community members. About the program: Pedaling Through the Ages—Cracking the Code: Historical Guidelines and Strategies for informed Performance

Pedaling on the modern piano is not an exact science, but there are critical principles that can shape our informed performance. In this lecture, Dr. Timmons will explore performance practice guidelines, historically informed choices, keyboard instruments spanning some 350 years, how we adapt the modern piano to past practices, and essential skills required for artful pedaling. Weaving in demonstration and lecture, Dr. Timmons will offer clear strategies and historical guidelines to a more artful use of the modern piano pedals. A bibliography for further reading is also provided.

About Dr. Jill Timmons, NCTM

Jill Timmons has performed internationally as both a solo pianist and ensemble artist and has offered performances and educational residencies on three Dr. Timmons, has been a featured artist on National Public Radio, has performed under the auspices of the National Endowment for the Arts and has recorded on the Laurel, Centaur, and Capstone labels. Ken Burns chose music from her Amy Beach recording for the soundtrack to his PBS documentary, *The War*. She is a National Endowment Fellow, receiving a funding award for the recording of the complete works for solo piano by American composer, William Bergsma (Laurel Records); as an award-winning author, Timmons has written on topics that include entrepreneurship and volunteerism within the arts and humanities.



Currently, Timmons is the Artist/Teacher Affiliate with Classic Pianos at their flagship store in Portland, Oregon, and in their satellite locations in Bellevue, Denver, Anchorage, Las Vegas, Boston, and Albuquerque. She holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Washington and the Master of Music degree from Boston University.
