When: Session 1 July 14-22, 2010 (9 days). Session 2 July 23-31, 2010 (9 days). OK to host either or both sessions.



Please submit a billing form, in advance, for these expenses and the treasurer will prepare a check, either sending it directly to the vender or venue, or to the chair.

Spring Syllabus for OMTA Eugene District took place on May 13-16 this year at teachers' studios and University of Oregon classrooms. It was a busy and successful event with 30 participating teachers, 200 students and 10 adjudicators. There were 128 successful evaluations, 44 demonstrations, 28 auditions and 10 forfeits. Among these there were 9 successful level X evaluations, students of Virginia Buhn, Ellen McQuilkin, Patricia Morse, Mary Ellen Yost, Fern McArthur and Lucy Clevenger.

from the archives...

(I found these guidelines for District Recitals from 1981. We have made a few changes since then! --editor)

Recommendations for Recital Procedures for Eugene District OMTA

1. Each teacher may present ONE student at EACH recital. If there are enough students for two recitals the first one will be at 7 PM and the second at 7:45 PM.

2. The first recital is limited to grade school students and junior high students who have not reached the Bach Two-Part Invention level and who have had limited experience. The second is for high school and advanced junior high students.

3. Performance time for each student should be limited to 3 minutes.

4. Music for all recitals should be from the Syllabus suggested list or a comparable list. No popular music is acceptable.

5. Piano students are encouraged to perform from memory. Voice students are required to perform from memory. Music may, however, be used in the Fall recital.

6. If a description or translation of the music is deemed necessary by the teacher, it will be typed and inserted into the program.

7. The privilege of recital performance should be passed around. No one student should always be presented at every recital.

8. Students participating in the program are asked to sit together during the program.

9. Teachers and students are expected to arrive on time and remain until the program is finished.

10. Please encourage students to dress as one would for a "special" occasion.

11. The \$2.00 recital fee is paid at the time dues are paid.

The Piano Doctor

One of the bass strings on my piano has started to buzz and has become quite annoying. What causes this, and is there a way to correct it?

A piano's bass strings are an exercise in compromise. To sound its very best, the lowest A string would need to be about 23 feet long! Of course it would be impractical to design pianos just to satisfy the laws of acoustics, but we know that the longer the bass strings are, the better they sound. This is why a 9' concert grand usually has a more glorious sounding bass than a 6' studio grand, and why the taller uprights have a more resonant bass than a spinet. A spinet or console often looses bass tone quality in the second octave; the lowest octave often sounding "tubby" or dull.



To compensate for the lack of length, the strings need to be "fatter." Thus piano bass strings are a compromise between length and diameter. Increasing the diameter requires wrapping the steel core wire with one or more layers of copper wire. When some part of the copper winding becomes loose, the string will start to buzz or ring. This is usually caused by age, but may also be caused by a defect in the string that doesn't show itself for several years. The only solution is to replace the annoying bass string. The guilty string is removed and sent to a string shop for duplication. The new string is then installed and, after a brief breaking-in period, the problem is solved.

Some thoughts on Transfer Students...

Transfer student: a student who has studied previously with one or more teachers. I have known teachers who love to receive transfer students from other teachers. These students have usually completed learning the basics of music reading and are now ready to tackle standard repertoire. I have also known teachers who are reluctant to accept transfer students because they may have a sketchy, incomplete grounding in the rudiments of music, or may come with flaws in technique and musicianship. I have always enjoyed the special challenge of helping a transfer student make the transition to my studio. Here are some of the guidelines I follow:

1. When I receive a phone call from the student or parent, I first determine if they are still enrolled in lessons with a teacher, or if lessons have already ended. If they are still receiving lessons from a teacher, I will not discuss accepting the student unless their current teacher contacts me first. If lessons have ended, I always contact the former teacher to make sure all business and personal matters between the prospective student and the teacher have been settled, before I consider accepting the student.

2. At the interview, I take considerable time to get the most complete overview of the student's past study and experience. I ask to see music studied over the past year, recital and performance history, syllabus records, etc. I also ask the student to perform two or three pieces, do some sight reading, and I like to assess their knowledge of music theory. The more I can learn about the student's background, the better equipped I am to make the the student's transition easier.

3. I never say anything negative about the student's performance, background, or pervious teacher(s). I might find that the student has poor music reading skills, sloppy technique and limited musical aptitude, but voicing these concerns serves no useful purpose. I look forward to the challenge of helping a student overcome any gaps in their musical background. It is too easy to fault a student's former teacher(s) for such problems, but I have found that in almost every instance the source is with the student or the student's family situation and not with the teacher.

4. Teach with the greatest possible patience and understanding. The student may have been with a beloved teacher for many years and the change is very difficult for them. The student may have had a bad experience with a previous teacher, or has moved often and studied from many teachers. I have found that a student who has studied with a parent or other family member, also needs adequate time to adjust to a teacher outside the family.

5. If possible, I begin the lessons with the music the student last studied; ongoing or unfinished pieces, unfinished method books, and music that is familiar to them. I find this makes the transition easier for the student, and I know I will have ample time to gradually incorporate my own materials and repertoire selections when the time is right. I would never say "We will need to start all over from the beginning." Rather, I prefer saying to the student, "Let's begin where you left off and if we find any "gaps" we can fill them in along the way."

6. As a courtesy, always give credit to the student's former teacher on recital programs, etc. for at least the first three months of lessons.

Looking back to former students of mine who have gone on to study music at the collegiate level, and graduate with a music degree, about half were transfer students from other teachers. In every instance, their first teacher provided them with the essential foundation in music upon which all future study could be built. I am grateful to these teachers for their excellent work.

The master class series is free. Piano

teachers are welcomed and encouraged to attend. Interested participants must register by October 1, 2010. This event is not open to the public.
